RAINwater Management: WHY MCS?

- Mandate: To promote sustainable, livable communities.
- Local Government Department:

Vancouver Island Coordinating Team

- <u>Mission</u>: To facilitate a consistent, science-based approach to rainwater management on Vancouver Island.
- Objective: Align efforts to advance the state-of-the-practice in rainwater management.
- Implementation is keyed to use of the Water Balance Model
- Team includes representatives from:
 - 3 Provincial Ministries (MoE, MAL, MCS)

Because local government exerts control over rainwater runoff volume through its policies, practices and standards....we will be rolling out



...a runoff-based tool that enables correlation of runoff volume management with stream health





What is QUALHYMO?

- A rainfall-runoff model developed by Dr. Charles Rowney for the Ontario Ministry of Environment in the 1980s
- The tool of choice by experts in Ontario and Alberta



Water Balance Model + QUALHYMO =

- Integrating the site with the watershed and the stream
- Now, users will be able test alternative scenarios during planning in a watershed

Infrastructure Planning Grant Program

- Grants up to \$10,000 to support infrastructure plans and studies.
- Purpose: To assist local governments in developing sustainable infrastructure.

Capital Grant Programs

Capital Grant Programs typically support applications that:

- > Minimize hydrological footprint
- > Use integrated rainwater management
- > Reduce water supply demand e.g. greywater reuse,
- > Incorporate low impact development
- > Support provincial plans, goals and guidelines
- ► Generate transferable knowledge





Towns for Tomorrow

- For municipalities with a population under 5,000
- The program supports projects that:
 - Advance sustainable planning, design, construction and management
 - > Promote innovative approaches
 - > Produce environmental benefits
- Applications are now being accepted for 2008

Federal Gas Tax Agreement

- Funds up to 100% of project costs
- Purpose is to help achieve:
 - Cleaner Water
 - Cleaner Air
 - > Reduced Greenhouse Gas Emission

\$7.4 MILLION for an innovative rainwater management project and to improve roadworks

Success in the Capital Regional District

\$296,000 for installation of a 630 m² green roof.











Building Canada Fund

- November 6, 2007: BC becomes the 1st province to sign an agreement under the *Building Canada Fund*
- Agreement provides more funding over a longer period of time than any previous federal infrastructure initiative.
- Building Canada is focused on supporting national priorities such as a cleaner water

Leveraging Change

TODAY: Program guides "provide direction". Ranking criteria supports green projects

TOMORROW: Grant conditions used to bring some recipients up to a certain "green" standard

DOWN THE ROAD: Meeting a "green" standard will be a requirement for grant eligibility





RECOGNITION: Green City Awards

- \$500,000 a year awarded to local governments
- Awarded to BC's most **SUSTAINABILE** communities
